

Working Title: Clinical Assistant/Associate Professor-Small

Animal Surgery

Degree and area of specialization:

DVM or equivalent degree with advanced training in veterinary small animal surgery. Preference will be given to candidates who are either certified by the American College of Veterinary Surgery or are eligible to take the ACVS board certifying examination.

License/certification:

Must maintain a Wisconsin license to practice Veterinary Medicine

Minimum number of years and type of relevant work experience:

Advanced training in general surgery (soft tissue surgery) is required.

Position Summary:

The Department of Surgical Sciences at the University Of Wisconsin School Of Veterinary Medicine seeks applicant for a position as a Clinical Assistant/Associate Professor in Small Animal Soft Tissue Surgery.

Principal duties:

Responsibilities include didactic teaching of students in lectures and laboratories, education and training of surgical residents, clinical service in the Veterinary Medical Teaching Hospital which includes receiving and management of clinical cases, consultation regarding care of small animals with practicing veterinarians, and providing continuing education at the local, regional and national level. Clinical track faculty are typically assigned to 24-26 weeks of clinic duty annually. Participation in classroom lecture and laboratory to be equitably distributed across the section. Clinical duties include leading resident-based or student-based rounds that involve approximately 3 hours per week. Student case based rounds are conducted by faculty in conjunction with residents and interns when the faculty are assigned to clinic duties. The successful candidate will be expected to conduct clinically relevant research and publish the results of scholarly activities.

Participation in after-hours emergency duty when scheduled on clinic duty is expected. Collaboration with other clinical services including emergency and critical care, oncology, cardiology, etc. in the management of surgical cases that require expertise from multiple specialty services is expected.

Participation in various administrative committees at the hospital, department, school, and campus level is expected and will be assigned by the Department Chair. Establishment of a research program targeted at advancement of the field with intramural and extramural funding for research is expected.

Successful candidates will work alongside three other faculty on the soft tissue surgery service and three other faculty on the orthopedic surgery service for case management and in sharing of instructional and administrative duties.

The soft tissue surgery clinical service is typically comprised of one faculty member, one or two small animal surgery residents, one rotating intern, and 2-6 fourth year veterinary students.

Distribution of time in clinical practice, teaching, research and service is expected to be in the range of the following, depending on unit needs:

Clinical practice: 40-50% Non-clinical teaching: 20%

Research: 20-30% Service: 10%
